### Scholarship Committee

For the past several months the Scholarship Committee, on behalf of the Horticultural Society, has been working on establishing a permanent award at Trent University. We have set up a Trust through the Ontario Trust for Student Support. With a one-time commitment of \$12,500, which is matched by the provincial government, an annual award of \$1000 is given to a student in financial need with an average of at least 85%. Recipients are chosen through the Financial Aid Office at Trent University. The award is given through the interest earned on the original endowment. This endowment ensures that there will always be an annual award given at Trent University on behalf of the Horticultural Society. The prize, which will be listed in the Trent Handbook, reads as follows:

*"Peterborough Horticultural Society Award Established by the Peterborough Horticultural Society (founded 1861), to be awarded to a full-time undergraduate student in any year who is majoring in Environmental and Resource Sci-*

*ence/Studies and who has an interest in our natural world and its preservation."*

This award is not meant to replace our Scholarship Programme but to augment it. We will continue to award scholarships as long as we have the funds to do so.

## Flower Shows

Mini Flower Show at our October meeting. Please place entries between 6:45 and 7:15

The following is the list of classes. The preserves will be judged and therefore must meet the criteria for entering. The Specimen and Design classes will be for display only but we will have comments and suggestions to help you for the shows in 2009.

Section A: PRESERVES - must be in 250 or 500 ml. preserving jars with 2 piece lids.

Note: unsealed jars will not be judged

- Class 1. Grape Jelly  
2. Raspberry Jam  
3. Sweet Pickles

Section B: SPECIMEN (Cut Flowers) (must be grown by the exhibitor)

- Class 4. Any late flowering annual or perennial, 1 stem in a vase, named if possible.

Section C: FRUIT/VEGETABLE (must be grown by the exhibitor)

- Class 5. Any fruit or vegetable, named if possible

*Fruit - Cluster - 1 stem; small fruit - 1/2 pint approximately; large fruit - 3 specimen.*

*Vegetables - small-3 specimen, large-1 specimen*

Section D: DESIGN (purchased material may be used)

- Class 6. Door Swag  
7. Table Arrangement

### This Month in the Garden – October Peterborough & Area Master Gardeners

- Dig, dry and store summer-flowering bulbs and tubers.
- Prepare new garden beds. Incorporate nearly completed compost.
- Put ponds to bed.
- Cut off dead foliage particularly around hostas or lilies where pests can over-winter. Leave ornamental grasses.
- Continue to plant spring flowering bulbs.
- Rake leaves from lawn and garden and add to reduced compost pile.
- Plant amaryllis for Christmas bloom.
- Remove and distribute almost finished compost. Gather leaves and add to compost pile.
- Seed new lawns

### Tips and Techniques

At this time of the year, the volume of fallen leaves is overwhelming. We are no longer able to burn them but they still must be dealt with. So – what can we do?

One solution is to remove them from your property. Bag them and place at the curb for green waste pick up but do not rake and leave them to the curb. What a mess when drainage grates are covered!

If you are able to compost on your own property, run the lawn mower over the leaves to hasten decomposition. This is the only time of the year that we use the bag attachment on our mower. 'Cutting the grass' really means picking up the leaves and while the grass clippings do help to hasten the process, the main purpose is to pick up the leaves as quickly as possible. Some of these chopped leaves can be put on the beds. These leaves will protect the plants, and start to decompose before we are able to get into the garden. Avoid putting thick layers of leaves over plants that are evergreen or small.

Wire or wooden corrals can be temporarily constructed to store the leaves over the winter. Make sure there is sufficient moisture as dry leaves can sit for years without breaking down.

Put a thick layer on the vegetable garden. These may be dug in or left on top for the winter,

Don't forget to keep a small pile available so you can add them to your composter

Of course there is the benign neglect rule – in Gary's words 'He who rakes last, rakes least.'
