OHA HISTORY BOOK

The Ontario Horticultural Association is preparing a second edition of the history which will cover the years from the early '70s to present. Pauline Drake has prepared the following report which will be included in the publication.

PETERBOROUGH: Established in 1861, the Peterborough Horticultural Society is one of the oldest. Records indicate membership was at an all time high of 596 in 1947, with as few as 162 members in 1970 and continuing low throughout the '80s. Membership has increased steadily, no doubt due to the increased interest of horticulture by the baby boomers, and it now stands at over 250 members (both male and female), not only from the city of Peterborough, but also from surrounding townships. There are a number of long serving members with 10 being granted lifetime membership.

In 1993 the PHS took responsibility for the care of Fleming Park, a half-acre park located in downtown Peterborough. The Park was originally dedicated in 1945 in honour of Sir Sandford Fleming, one of Peterborough's most famous residents. The PHS takes great pleasure in the revitalization of the park with its many heritage plants.

The most significant project, initiated in 2001 by the

PHS and Master Gardeners, has been the Peterborough Garden Show, "For the Love of Gardening Show" held annually over a 3-day period, drawing 8000 visitors, and 150 vendors.

On July 15, 2004, Peterborough experienced one of the worst floods in its history. Our extensive collection of library books, which was housed at the downtown Library was partially destroyed (128 books lost) and two blocks away Fleming Park was also heavily damaged. With the help of volunteers and hard work the Park was redesigned and revitalized.

PHS shares a website www.peterboroughgardens.ca with the Peterborough and Area Master Gardeners and the Garden Show. Much information about gardening and the activities of the PHS can be found on that site.

The PHS is very active. Our monthly meetings combine a bit of socializing and always include an informative guest speaker; 8-10 workshops are held each year; other activities include "Mystery Tours" and bus trips, usually 2-3 per year; as well as a Spring & Fall plant sale. In 2009 we have introduced judged Flower Shows (2 per year). PHS has a monthly newsletter, which can be found on our website www.peterboroughgardens.ca.

The Peterborough Horticultural Society is particularly proud that it has been able to contribute to a number of community beautification projects in and around Peterborough (revitalizing local parks, a school butterfly garden, local zoo, senior residences, as well as the Kawartha Tourism Visitor Information Centre). In 2001 a Scholarship Program was established to annually provide six awards of \$1000 each to local students studying horticulture or related programs. In 2008 the PHS Scholarship Committee established a permanent award at Trent University to be given to a full-time undergraduate student majoring in Environmental and Resource Science/Studies who has an interest in our natural world and its preservation. In all, PHS has contributed \$86,000 over the past 8 years to such things as community beautification projects and scholarships.

Since 2005 the city of Peterborough has entered the "Communities in Bloom" competitions. A daylily has been named "Peterborough" in honour of the Communities in Bloom activities. Each year, citizens offer their gardens in a garden competition and the city hosts the judges and proudly shows off the gardens of Peterborough.

In July 2009, District 4 hosted the OHA Convention ("Remember Yesterday – Protect Tomorrow") at Trent University in Peterborough. Approximately 500 delegates from all over the province were in attendance.



PHS was responsible for arranging the speakers and organizing over 175 volunteers. Activities over the three-day period included seminars, workshops, adult & youth competitions, a youth camp, vendor displays, bus tours and boat tours on the Otonabee River.

THIS MONTH IN THE GARDEN – PETERBOROUGH & AREA MASTER GARDENERS

OCTOBER

- Dig, dry and store summer-flowering bulbs and tubers.
- Prepare new garden beds. Incorporate nearly completed compost.
- Put ponds to bed.
- Cut off dead foliage particularly around lilies where pests can over-winter.
- To avoid the potential of infecting healthy plants with the Hosta X virus, wait until the leaves are dead and pull them.
- Leave ornamental grasses.
- Continue to plant spring flowering bulbs.
- Rake leaves from lawn and garden and add to reduced compost pile.
- Plant amaryllis for Christmas bloom.
- Remove and distribute almost finished compost and gather leaves to add to compost pile.
- Seed new lawns.
