# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The year began with preparations for the 2014 Peterborough Garden Show, always a major undertaking. The Garden Show was held April 11<sup>th</sup> – 13<sup>th</sup>. With weather co-operating, it was one of the smoothest and most successful shows yet. With over 150 vendors, great speakers and demos, a well-attended Children's Garden and new events, we again attracted about 8,000 visitors. This Show could not be run without the valuable volunteer hours contributed by our members. Over 100 of you volunteered at the Show in everything from organizing, set up, décor, ticket sales, coat check, Children's Garden etc. This much loved and anticipated Show promotes interest and awareness of horticulture in our community, a main objective of the PHS, as well as raising funds. After sharing Garden Show profits with the Peterborough Master Gardeners, PHS had \$10,000 for Beautification Grants in our community and our four \$1,000 post-secondary Scholarships in a horticulture-related field.

In May our annual Spring Plant Sale was held again at Westdale United Church. Despite a cold, late spring members managed enough plant donations to raise close to \$900 and we again sold out very quickly.

Activities in Fleming Park, the heritage garden our Society maintains for the city, began on Earth Day with about a dozen hardy volunteers braving the cold and rain for a spring clean-up of the gardens. Spirits were good though, especially after The Magic Rolling Pin surprised us with hot coffee and cookies, and a lot was accomplished. Our loyal Fleming Park workers met every Wednesday morning throughout the summer and have continued transforming the interior beds with massive plantings and truckloads of mulch. With the seasonal changes, it continues to look lovely!

In June, four long-time members were recognized at the District 4 OHA June Celebration Luncheon. Inge Buchardt, Trudy Minicola, Velma Doris and Giovanna Ronco received 25-year membership pins.

We were fortunate to have some lovely garden tours to enjoy this summer. Peterborough Master Gardeners celebrated their 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and Omemee Horticulture Society their 75th Anniversary, both with impressive Garden Tours.

The fall season was launched with a popular speaker, Frank Kershaw, and our Fall Flower Shows. Our warm September prompted a great display of flowers and vegetables. In October, interesting carved pumpkins added to the flowers and photos.

Our year closes in November with the AGM and a new Board for 2015, the presentation of our four \$1,000 post-secondary Scholarships and a festive sharing of home-made Holiday treats, the mitten tree and food share donations.

As this is my last year as President, I'd like to thank all the great, committed Board Members I've worked with over the past four years and all the many members of the PHS who have been so supportive and responded to my many calls for volunteers.

# PURPOSE OF THE PETERBOROUGH HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

# SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME

**SCHOLARSHIPS**: up to four (4) scholarships of \$1000.00 (one thousand dollars) each, presented annually if suitable applications are received, and at the sole discretion of the PHS Scholarship Committee.

**ELIGIBILITY**: an applicant must meet one of the following two criteria:

- any local student who has been accepted by a Canadian post-secondary institution into any year of a horticultural, landscape design, or other related program, as approved by the Scholarship Committee;

OR

- any Canadian student who has been accepted by either Trent University or Fleming College into any year of a horticultural, landscape design, or other related program, as approved by the Scholarship Committee.

**HOW TO APPLY**: the applicant must fulfill all four of the following requirements:

- clearly demonstrate how she/he meets the eligibility requirements;
- submit proof of acceptance into a horticultural related program;
- submit a current resume and most recent transcript of grades;
- ♦ submit a typewritten essay of 300 500 words, describing when you first became interested in horticulture, practical experience you have had as a volunteer or employee, any horticulture related workshops or courses you have taken, and your career plans in this field.

# SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

The Peterborough Horticultural Society recently awarded the 2014 Scholarships for post-secondary education. The following four students have been selected to receive \$1000 awards:

ADAM WOOD is an environmentalist who is currently studying Sustainable Agriculture at Fleming College after completing a bachelor's degree in Education focusing on Environmental Science, Outdoor Education and Experiential Education. He worked for two summers for a non-profit youth development organization running an urban vegetable market garden with local teenagers. Adam is currently interning at a homestead near Cameron, ON looking after vegetables, pastures and livestock. He is interested in pollinators and is hoping to bring his agricultural knowledge into the classroom at some point in the future.

MONICA FROMBERGER is currently in her 2nd year at Trent's Environmental Science and Studies Program, having completed year 1 on the Dean's List. She is involved with the Environmental Sustainability Living Learning Community at Trent; discovering various healthy environment topics together with other members. She has maintained a plot at the Community Garden in Oshawa, growing vegetables from seeds she acquired at Peterborough's Seedy Sunday, as well she has volunteered at the Feathered Friends Festival, also in Oshawa. She has been a committee youth member on the Durham Environmental Advisory Committee and has competed in the Durham Envirothon. She hopes to use her degree to help protect our natural environment for future generations.

JONATHAN DUFFY is enrolled in the second year of Trent's Sustainable Agriculture and Food Systems Program. He lives on an organic farm just outside Peterborough where he is learning first-hand the different techniques of organic farming. He volunteers at the Trent Vegetable Gardens at the university. He has also volunteered as a tree-planter and is a full participant in the Trent Sustainable Agriculture and Food Safety Society Club. He hopes to use his horticulture knowledge after graduation by operating an urban farm or working with small not-for-profit organizations to help to integrate mini-farms and gardens into urban environments.

MICHAEL MARCUCCI grew up in downtown Toronto and has always been fascinated by trees. He is currently enrolled in an Urban Forestry Certificate Program at Fleming College – having already completed a bachelor's degree at the University of Toronto in Forest Conservation/Urban Forestry. While at UofT, Michael was on the Dean's List and received multiple academic awards. Michael has been an Urban Forestry Intern in Toronto, and the chair of a backyard tree-planting volunteer organization. His future plans involve urban forestry and becoming a consulting arborist.

NATHAN LEW of Kenner Collegiate is the winner of the Madge Harris Award.
VICTORIA COLLINS of Thomas A. Stewart is the winner of the Olive Isaac Award.

Proceeds from the annual Garden Show make it possible to fund these scholarships. As well, beautification grants are given to local organizations to fund garden related projects. In addition, two special endowment funds have been established with Trent University and Fleming College. Since its inception in 2002, the Peterborough Horticultural Society has awarded almost \$150,000 in scholarships and community garden projects.

# RULES & REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS FOR FLOWER SHOWS

### General

- 1. Exhibitors shall be a member, in good standing, of the Peterborough Horticultural Society
- 2. Horticultural Exhibitors must be amateur. Design Exhibitors must be amateur. An amateur is a person who does not earn his/her livelihood from the growth and/or sale of flowers, vegetables, plants or fruits. Exhibitors must be present to place entries onto the show tables.
- 3. Exhibitors are limited to one entry in each section in each class unless specified.
- 4. All exhibits must be in place by the specified time.
- 5. The exhibitor must grow entries in the horticultural (specimen) classes. In the design classes, the exhibitor may purchase the materials.
- 6. Exhibitors must furnish their own clean, clear, glass containers and the exhibits must be removed after the show. The Society will not be responsible for any loss or damage to the containers.
- 7. Each entry must be accompanied by a completed entry tag. Name the cultivar where possible. Entry tags will be available from the Show Committee prior to each show.
- 8. Judges will use the publication "Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards" (Publication #34) for all guidelines and rules. Copy can be found in PHS Library.
- 9. The decision of the judge is final. Judges may withhold an award if in their opinion the exhibit is not worthy.

### Design

- 10. In Design Classes, accessories may be used. (Unless otherwise stated)
- 11. In Design Classes, material must be fresh (not dry, silk, etc.). (Unless otherwise stated).

### Horticulture

- 12. Artificial materials are not permitted.
- 13. Unless otherwise stated, buds showing colour are counted as blooms.
- 14. A Class may be subdivided and/or a new Class may be created at the discretion of the Show Committee.

### **Photography**

- 15. Photos must have been taken by the exhibitor within the past 24 months.
- 16. Entries are limited to one per exhibitor in each class.
- 17. Prints must be in colour unless otherwise specified.
- 18. Prints must not exceed 4" X 6" (10cm X15 cm) OR 5" X 7" (12cm X17 cm) No frames allowed.
- 19. Each print must be accompanied by a fully completed entry tag.
- 20. Entries must be picked up at the end of the meeting.
- 21. Entries must not have been previous winners at a PHS show.

### **Exhibitors Information**

- Clearly print your complete name (first and last) on entry tags
- Oasis should NOT be seen. Try not to take a flower out and then replace it. The block will break if full of holes.
- Gladioli and Iris display best in narrow necked containers.
- Study the categories carefully. Make sure your exhibit is placed in the proper category.
- Submit your entry on time.
- In specimen classes, judges look for uniformity in size, colour and perfection. Try to avoid mismatches in size and colours.
- Check all foliage and remove blemished or damaged leaves. Faded or black petals should be removed.

### **CONDITIONING TIPS FOR FLOWER SHOWS**

- 1. Use only very clean vases, pail and clippers. Rinse pails, knives and clippers periodically with mild chlorine bleach solution.
- 2. Cut flowers in the cool of the day, either early morning or late evening. Immerse stems immediately after cutting in a pail of tepid water.
- 3. Remove unnecessary foliage, including any leaves that will be submerged when arranged.
- 4. Recut stems on the diagonal, removing 1 inch, preferably under water.
- 5. Plunge stems into deep water. Leave for several hours or overnight in a cool draught free area.
- 6. A commercial florist preservative may be added to the water, but if used in the water for conditioning, it must also be used in the water for arranging.
- 7. To condition ferns, break off rather than cut stems and completely submerge in cool water for 12 hours before arranging.
- 8. Iris can be conditioned in 3 drops of peppermint in a quart of water and arranged in shallow water.

# SECTION A: SPECIMEN (Cut Flower) (see pg. 22-pub. #34) CLASS

- 1. Daffodil/Narcissus, 1 stem, any cultivar, no foliage (do not remove spathe (beige sheath)

# GRANTS FOR BEAUTIFICATION PROJECTS 2013-2014

The money that is available for Beautification Projects comes from some of the profit from our previous year's Garden Show. In the 2013-14 year we had a budget of \$5,500.

- 5. Lakefield Youth Unlimited to enlarge on their successful canoe lettuce project.
- 6. Millbrook Garden Club & Municipal Heritage Committee to plant perennials and shrubs in their resting garden.
- 7. Nourish Havelock Task Force to develop a new community garden.
- 8. Peterborough Exhibition Agricultural Society for prizes for their "Junior Garden Show".

Due to extenuating circumstances, 2 other applicants withdrew their requests.

Our Committee meets in April to review any application and if awarded, funds are usually sent out in mid May of that year after the Board's approval.
